

Founder of local Black History museum to speak on Feb. 8

Carolyn Hoskins, founder of the new Domini Hoskins Black History Museum and Learning Center in Belmont, will talk about her efforts to educate today's youth about Black History at 2 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 8, in the Community Room of the Redwood Shores Library.

Hoskins, who lives in Belmont, says she decided to create a museum when her grandson, Domini, told her he knew everything there was to know about Martin Luther King Jr. Domini's school project for Black History Month became an exploration of the overlooked historical contributions of African Americans.

Last year she was recognized by the NAACP San Mateo Branch at the 93rd annual celebration of Herby Dawkins Freedom Fund Banquet for her community service. She is involved in a number of charitable enterprises in our area.

The museum was featured at the 2019 San Mateo County Fair.

Her presentation will be open to the public. The library is located at Redwood Shores and Bridge parkways in Redwood Shores.

Legal Advocacy Fund

The Legal Advocacy Fund works to challenge sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace.

LAF is currently supporting Freyd v. University of Oregon. Professor Jennifer J. Freyd, a respected senior faculty member in the University of Oregon's psychology department, is paid significantly less than many of her male colleagues of equal rank as a result of "retention raises," or salary increases given in response to a competing offer.

In this case, Professor Freyd has taken

action against the university, contending that its practice of granting such raises, without equalizing salaries of other faculty of comparable merit, has a disparate impact on women and violates the Equal Pay Act and Oregon's sex discrimination law.

Female hygiene kits

A hygiene kit for girls and women in refugee camps and remote or depressed areas of the world is a project adopted by the Citrus Heights Branch, which will be presented at the state convention.

The aim is to teach girls proper hygiene and keep them in school or at work during their menses.



Primary elections are coming up March 3. Now's the time to begin planning at the branch level how to address these activities in our communities. Women who vote can influence the outcome of an election!

What opportunities should be considered?

Voter registration

AAUW California is well-positioned to undertake voter registration, especially with our college/university relationships. Millennial women are an important target group. Research shows that a lack of information on the candidates and a lack of policy debates on issues of importance are the main reasons some millennial women don't participate in the election process, and may not even register to vote.

Get involved by organizing a voter registration drive in your community or on your local college campus.




