

Welcome to a busy new year for our Mid-Peninsula Branch

Our branch supports the AAUW mission to promote gender equity through educational support at the local level.

Continuing our work since 1998, this summer eight girls were sent to Tech Trek camp and one to a virtual camp. Our branch lacked sufficient Tech Trek funds to send an additional three qualified girls to camp.

A \$2,000 scholarship was awarded to a Cañada college graduate who will be attending a four-year college this fall. She thankfully replied that this will help with expenses as she won't be able to work as often. Next year she will be given an additional \$2,000 for her second year.

Tuition was also provided for a woman in the Women's Mentoring and Leadership Academy at Skyline College to attend the annual National Conference for College Women Student Leaders in Washington, D.C., where she learned leadership skills. We need your donations and fundraising activities to continue this fulfilling work.

Our branch will again hold monthly general meetings starting Sept.13. Our VPs of Program will focus on topical issues such as the Electoral College and human trafficking and ensure the programs support diversity, equity and inclusion.

Tech Trek champion Jean Dehner died Aug. 12

Jean Dehner, the former principal of Arundel Elementary School in San Carlos and the former Tech Trek Coordinator for Mid-Peninsula Branch, died Aug. 12 in San Carlos where she had lived for the past 47 years.

Past President Chris Panero remembered that "Jean worked hard at keeping up-to-date with Tech Trek alumnae."

A San Mateo Daily Journal article in 2017 mentioned that Jean "had just hosted a reflection event for participants and supporters of Tech Trek, where Dehner serves as a volunteer and 'dorm mom.'

"She was blown away by parent accounts of their daughters' excitement when they picked them up from camp.

"That's why I get so psyched about it," she said. "These girls have these experiences, and when they walk out, they're transformed."

Aftere 10 years working as a school

and her husband arrived in the area.

She said she chose the teaching profession because she had been raised by parents who were educators, and she saw teaching as the field with the most opportunities for

"There were not a lot of career choices for women," she said. "Teaching was one of the fields wide open for women."

The newspaper article noted that Dehner spent more than 30 years in San Carlos schools, serving as a dean, assistant principal and principal. She would soon find that what started as a logical career decision would become her life's passion.

"Doing things with kids keeps my enthusiasm up," she said. "I get incredible satisfaction out of doing things that benefit kids."

In 2016, the San Carlos Chamber of Commerce named Jean the city's Citizen of the Year.

Washington State AAUW to present a Zoom panel on the status of Title IX

A panel of three experts will discuss the past, present and future of Title IX in a Zoom forum from 5:30-7 p.m. Sept. 17, presented by AAUW Washington State.

Panelists will include Dr. Dorothy Mc-Bride, professor emerita of political science at Florida Atlantic University; Dr. Julie McCleery, co-director, University of Washington Center for Leadership in Athletics; and Dr. Domanic Vanthom, vice chancellor and deputy Title IX coordinator, Washington State University, Vancouver.

This panel will provide attendees with a deeper understanding of the legal, cultural and political dimensions of Title IX — from its 1972 origins to the most recent developments in 2025.

It will focus on its impact on gender equity in education, athletics and beyond.
